#### LIVING OUR CALL AS DISCIPLES

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, today's readings invite us to reflect deeply on what it means to be disciples of Jesus Christ. In the Gospel of Mark, we see Jesus sending out his disciples two by two, empowering them with authority over unclean spirits and sending them to spread the message of repentance. This mission wasn't just for those disciples in the past; it continues to resonate with each of us today.

Firstly, Jesus sends them out two by two. This companionship reminds us of the importance of community in our faith journey. We are not meant to walk alone. Our relationships within the Church and our communities strengthen and support us as we navigate life's challenges and joys.

Secondly, Jesus grants his disciples authority over unclean spirits. This authority is not just about doing miracles; it's about our duty as Christians to stand up against wrong and unfairness in our world. We are called to bring healing and freedom, sharing God's love and truth with those who need it.


Thirdly, Jesus instructs them to rely on the hospitality of others. This teaches us humility and trust in God's providence. It challenges us to both offer and receive hospitality graciously, recognizing that our ability to support one another is a reflection of God's love working through us.

Do we recognize the authority and responsibility we have been given to bring healing and liberation to those around us? Let us pray that God may grant us the grace to be faithful disciples, willing to follow Jesus wherever he leads us and to share his love with all whom we encounter. May our lives bear witness to the transformative power of the Gospel.

#### Reminder of dates for the Sacrament of Confirmation 2024: Our Lady of Perpetual Help - Richmond

Thank you and congratulations to all those who successfully completed their first Sacrament of Reconciliation on or around the 9th June.

This is now a reminder that preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation will begin at the end of the second week of Term 3. Dates and times are as follows:

#### **Confirmation:**

I. Preparation Sessions:

Dates: 4th August, 11th August, 18th August, 25th August. A practice may be required at 5pm on Thurs 5th Sept. Time: 9.30 - 11am each Sunday with morning tea to follow.

2. The Sacrament of Confirmation will take place on Saturday 7th September at 5pm, with Archbishop Paul presiding. A light supper will follow.

Please note that Baptism is a prerequisite for the above sacraments and children must be 7-8 years or older. Parent sessions are held in conjunction with the childrens' programme and parents are required to attend. They do not need to be regular church attendees.

Registration for the Sacrament of Confirmation is now open.

#### DAY OF PRAYER FOR SEAFARERS

Away from family and friends for many months at a time, working long hours and navigating some of the world's most dangerous stretches of ocean, seafaring can be a tough, lonely and hazardous career. On this Day of Prayer for Seafarers, we pray especially for these hardworking men and women who are often forgotten. (Diocese of Palmerston North) Motueka is a fishing port, and Port Nelson is home New Zealand's largest fishing fleet. As many men and women from our region crew on these boats, and the Cook Strait Ferries running from Picton to Wellington, this is a timely and relevant feast day for us to remember.

#### SLOW NEWS WEEK

Yes, it is the middle of winter and everyone is hibernating. I mentioned the NZ Bishops document 'Towards October 2024' recently. If you have not had time to read it, then here are some random paragraphs below that sample the range of topics covered, and the neutral presentation of the ideas. Remember, these are the suggestions, not the rules! If you have a pet idea for making our Church more user friendly, you may find it in this document.

- 26. There is great diversity among the lay associations and organisations, and some sadness about the demise of lay associations prominent in the past, such as the Christian Family Movement. Some groups such as Passionist Family Groups, Focolare and Couples for Christ have memberships and gatherings which involve all ages. There are other groups oriented towards fellowship, spiritual growth and particular forms of mission, such as the St Vincent de Paul Society, Hearts Aflame, the Catholic Women's League and the Knights of the Southern Cross.
- 27. While not technically lay associations, Catholic schools across the country are for many people the place where they encounter the Church, even if they are not participants in parish activities. Schools are already places where co-responsibility is exercised, involving lay people, priests and the Bishop, and there may be lessons which could be learned from the schools.
- 35. Lay people brought their experience of appraisals and performance reviews into the context of clergy accountability and seek similar processes for their pastors. The Bishops considered that "performance reviews could be useful as long as they help priests and Bishops be better pastors".
- 51. For some respondents the word "structure" raised wider questions: "The whole structure of the Church needs to be re-examined. Does the parish structure still work?". The questions included physical structures: "Church buildings which are physically set up in the style of a lecture theatre promote a 'passive' vision of church which undermines co-responsibility and stifles liturgical creativity...".
- 64. Practical SUGGESTIONS relating to parishes and their Pastoral and Finance Committees:
- Each Bishop should mandate parish pastoral councils and parish finance committees so that members of these bodies must have a real say in parish matters.
- All parishes should be required to have an Annual General Meeting and there is full reporting of the financial situation of the parish to parishioners.
- Each Bishop should ensure that the parish priest presides at parish Finance Committee meetings but is not a member of the committee he consults with, and the priest is not the chairperson.


