## Beholding the heavens

"As darkness falls you renew your promise to reveal among us the light of your presence. By the light of Christ, your living Word, dispel the darkness of our hearts that we may walk as children of light.."

These are the opening words for our Sunday Mass, the 13<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time. Other significant moments we commemorated this week are the Nativity of St John the Baptist and Matariki, both of which happen in bleak mid-winter. On June 21 we also passed the winter solstice, when we experience the shortest day and the longest night.

You can still sometimes hear well-meaning people say, at times forcefully: "Matariki is a pagan celebration!" Well, many things in our Catholic tradition, Christmas included, are of pagan origin. But softened by the inner work of the Holy Spirit, and illumined by the Truth of God's Word, transformation happens. Interesting how the Matariki season seems to go hand-in-hand with John the Baptist, who in turn heralds the Light. Six months before we celebrate the birth of Jesus, we gather in darkness before God to mark the mid-point of the year and to acknowledge our need for illumination. In the time of year where light is scarce, we feel the need to commit to re-orientate ourselves. The soft illumination provided by the star cluster Matariki, like the birth of John the Baptist, can point us and prepare us to receive the True Light.

Jesus said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life" (John 8, 12).

The readings we hear today all remind us there are no short cuts. Short cuts are a waste of time at best. They can even lead to death. One sure way of knowing we are walking in the light is to be welcoming, remembering the words attributed to St Teresa of Ávila:

"Christ has no body now but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. \\

Yours are the eyes through which he looks compassion on this world.

Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good.

Yours are the hands through which he blesses all the world."

In a world where we experience so much exclusion and where hearts are becoming more and more narrow and hospitality more and more restrained, we need to rediscover the source of our hospitality in God. Looking for ways to be Christ's body on earth might take a little extra planning and effort. But gradually you will see the results of actively seeking opportunities to love others. You will feel your whole body reorient itself towards Christ. As His light shines within you, your doubts and your darkness will no longer dictate to you. As your hands and eyes and feet gradually become instruments of service, your whole body will be blessed.
